"Empowering Adolescents through Nature" **Feronia Forward** is a 501(c)3 nonprofit educational organization. Our mission is to teach children and young adults the importance of nature and the value of conservation through experiential education: we believe that contact with the natural world can benefit learning, health and wellbeing.

We grant scholarships to public schools where the majority of students receives food assistance, an indication of financial needs. Ramblewild, a sustainably managed natural forest in Berkshire County provides its infrastructure and staff: Ramblewild is a unique venue that serves as a living laboratory for learning: it incorporates a tree-to-tree aerial park, miles of nature trails, a campground, a sugarbush and a wind farm.

A Thanksgiving story

Last October, the 5th grade students of a Berkshire County public school visited Ramblewild on a Feronia Forward scholarship.

It was an amazing display of will-power, determination, and courage and strength.





At the end of the trail, Elliot ziplined to the ground. On this day, Elliot was just like the other kids in his class. His loud screams of joy were matched by the cheering of the other kids. There was not a dry eye to be found.

Imagine what it must have been like not only for him but for the other kids and everyone else in attendance: an empowering, life-transforming experience.

The American Legion was built on and committed to four key pillars that still stand today: Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation, National Security, Americanism, and Children and Youth

Membership year 2025 ~ December

We did it!! Ok, maybe a bit tardy, but we got to the 65%. and are in a good position for 75% by the 11th of December (yes, this year). As of 11/21/2024 the department is at 65.92% with a retention rate of 64.56%.

And speaking of retention rate! *REMEMBER*, the retention contest has a crucial deadline looming. A Post must achieve a 95% retention rate to remain eligible to remain in the running for a \$500.00 retention prize. Get 100% by New Years Eve - earn an additional 5 pts.

All Districts made it to the 65% goal, with a few just shy of the 75%, 11 December, goal. Let's look under every stone and carpet for renewals and new members. Why harp on membership continuously? We are a member based organization, and members drive the programs and the votes. And the votes drive Congress to back veteran programs

Still having a hard time with MyLegion.org? Please let us know, we can help, I mean it! Short story: Sat with a Post Commander to help with MyLegion.org. Went through the REGISTRATION portal, they send back a OTP (one time password). Go to his e-mail, only to find out his e-mail had been disabled and corrupt for 12.5 months. No wonder he couldn't get an OTP and could not register with MyLegion.

Can't say this enough: Got your permissions to work membership on MyLegion.org? If not, let us know, we can help. Before you call, make sure the Post Commander and Adjutant form is current. 38% have not submitted this form.

462 Post: This is our "cloud" of members, most know what it is and how it works. I will be sending this list out, want to get on an exclusive e-mail list, send me a note. Prepared as an Excel spreadsheet, it will be distributed to your District Membership Team (DMT).

Membership Sources: Consider giving the gift of membership. No Veterans stocking can be any happier than with a 2025 paid Legion membership. Got a family member that's a veteran but does not have a Legion membership, well

Got any Post members that "bail" the cold winter right after the holidays, get 'em renewed before they go.

CPR: New CPR being crafted, with a focus on size and being user friendly.

2025 Membership Retention Contest

Scope: To promote and sustain increased growth through the retention of current members of The American Legion. Encouragement is to be achieved through financial awards. Retention is a forefront goal of our National Commander.

Discussion: To effectually sustain growth, current members need to renew their memberships. Providing incentives and goals as targets with a financial reward has proven to be an effective means. DMS/Holding Post 462 and the Capitol Hill Post 297 are not eligible for this program.

Eligibility: The District must have a Membership Team appointed.

Post must physically meet a minimum of 4 times per year.

Post must attain a 95% renewal/retention rate.

Post must submit "Post Data Report" by April 15th of the contest Year. Post must submit "Consolidated Post Report" by May 31st of Contest Year.

Post must submit "Post Roster" by May 31st of Contest Year.

Post must submit "Certification of Service Record" by May 31st of Contest Year.

Post Membership designee must be registered in MyLegion.org.

Bonus point considerations: 1/2 point for each percentage point over 95%

The 2025 Boys State Program will be held at Stonehill College, North Easton, from Saturday, June 14, 2025 to Friday, June 20, 2025 This year, the cost of sponsoring each boy will be \$\frac{\$400.00}{000}\$ for the regular tuition, or \$\frac{\$375.00}{000}\$ for those who pay for students by the "EARLY BIRD" registration date of APRIL 15, 2025, after the cost is \$400.00. Please make your check payable to "The American Legion" and designate "Boys State" in the lower left corner of the check. Please use the tear-off sheet at the bottom of this notice (page 2) indicating your Post Chairman, as all future correspondence will be mailed directly to them. All checks for the 2025 Boys State Session must be in the hands of chairman by May 20, 2025. The first 400 applications will be accepted. We encourage you to actively seek outside co-sponsors (e.g. politicians, businesses, or banks) to help pay for these boys to attend.

Boys chosen to attend Boys State must be interviewed by the Post Chairman, and his signature attesting to this must appear on Citizen Applications. Each Post Chairman should explain Boys State in detail to the boys and their parents so that they will know what is expected of them during their stay. The Boys State website (http://www.maboysstate.org/) contains a wealth of information, 2025 interest application, including video, photographs, program books, and program descriptions. Students and parents should be directed to this resource for information and announcements.

Beginning in January 2025, we will have applications available via email or regular mail. Please select the email option on the tear-off sheet if that is how you would like to receive the paperwork.

RULES AND DEADLINES FOR DEPARTMENT BLUE CAP/LEGIONNAIRE OF THE YEAR

OBJUECTIVE: THE DEPARTMENT "BLUE CAP" OF THE YEAR is designed to recognize a Legionnaire who exemplifies the goals and objectives set forth by The American Legion. Nominees **MUST** be a "Blue Cap"

ELEGIBILITY: for this award requires that the candidate cannot be in an elected position authorized to wear a half white or a white cap; nor at the time of the award, have been elected (though not yet installed) to any such position. (Therefore, to prevent embarrassment, it shall be incumbent upon the recommending Post to report the ineligibility of the individual prior to the Department Convention.) This is the only restriction.

NOMINATION PROCEDURE: Any post, District or County may recommend any qualified member. Submissions should include this form (reverse side completed) and supporting documents as necessary for the committee to judge the qualifications, character and dedication of the nominee. **Nominee should be present at the Department Convention.**

Supporting documents MUST be included: They may include letters from civic groups, churches, other veteran organization; testimonials form fellow veterans, news clippings, etc.

DEADLINES: Blue Cap/Legionnaire Committee Chairman must receive <u>submissions no later</u> than April 15, 2025.

FINAL SELECTION OF one Department of Massachusetts BLUE CAP/LEGIONNAIRE OF THE YEAR will be determined by the Legionnaire of the year Committee <u>no later than May 1, 2025</u>. There will be no honorable mentions. The winner will receive a plaque and Legion cap.

WINNER will be honored and a guest of the Massachusetts American Legion State Convention in **2026**.

That nomination form must be signed by either the Department Adjutant or Department Employment Chairman. Selection of the national winners will be made by the Veterans Employment & Education Commission during the annual Washington Conference. The national winners will receive a stipend for travel expenses and are presented award plaques at the National Convention.





Frequently asked Questions

How large is the Sons of The American Legion (SAL)?

Currently, there are more than 379,000 members of the SAL in this country and abroad.

What is the administrative structure of the SAL?

The squadron is the basic level of membership in our organization. Different states (detachments) use different ways of grouping numbers of squadrons together. In most states, squadrons are grouped geographically and report to their own districts (also called areas or divisions). All districts (or areas or divisions) report to the state headquarters, referred to as a detachment. All state detachments report to the National Headquarters. In addition to the 50 state detachments in the U.S., there are also detachments in France, Mexico, Philippines and Puerto Rico.

What is the main purpose of the SAL?

The mission of the SAL is to support veterans and their families and the policies of our parent organization, The American Legion. Virtually everything that involves the SAL could be grouped under three areas: 1) support for veterans and their families, 2) promoting patriotism and Americanism and 3) promoting programs which benefit the youth of our country.
