LEGION Membership Awards—Bronze Brigade

Gold Brigade: A Legionnaire who recruits 50 or more new members (excluding any transfers) into The American Legion by the May target date will qualify for this award. The gifts awarded to a Gold Brigade recipient will depend on the number of times he or she has qualified for this award).

Silver Brigade: A Legionnaire who recruits 25 to 49 new members (excluding any transfers) into The American Legion by the May target date will qualify for this award. A silver pin and certificate will be awarded. NOTE: Silver Brigade and Gold Brigade awards cannot both be awarded to a recruiter during the same membership year.

Bronze Brigade: A Legionnaire who recruits 15 to 24 new members (excluding any transfers) into The American Legion by the May target date will qualify for this award. A Bronze Brigade patch and certificate will be awarded. NOTE: Bronze, Silver and Gold Brigade awards cannot be awarded to a recruiter during the same membership year.

The 2025 Membership "Renewal" period begins fresh on 1 July 2024. So the question that comes to mind is "If a new member is signed up for 2025 Membership year, are they eligible for Legion benefits 1 July through 31 December 2024 (new member). A discussion for another day. Hopefully everyone (meaning Posts) has new membership cards. Remember, as with any other program, Scouting, Youth Sports, Mason's, Rotary, strong membership is essential. Membership gives us the strength in not only our own programs, but a voice in Congress. To get noticed in Congress, you must be loud, and 2 million voices can be very loud. Our programs and Veterans benefits depend on a loud and clear voice.

Retention: I'm going to pick on my own District for a minute. Though new members are certainly needed to enrich The American Legion, retaining our current membership is just as, if not more, vital. 377 paid members from 2023 did not renew for 2024, ouch!

187 ~ 1- 4 yrs of mbrshp, 190 ~ 5 – 76 yrs mbrshp. Why does a member with 20 continuous years not renew? Maybe we should Buddy Check, and invite them back to the Post, just a thought. 109 non-renewing members are from the GW/Terrorism group, these Veterans are the "younger" ones we seek, but they are slipping out the back door. Also, 14 WWII veterans did not renew, I know, but they all didn't. Couldn't we pay their dues. These numbers only reflect District 4, Department wide we lost 1400+ (as of 6-3) out the back door. Imagine, with the 1400 non-renewals, and the 850 new members (great job, by the way), we could be close to the front stage at the National Convention.

Training: Many great training programs, especially for membership can be located at Legion.org/training. Membership moments with Matt Jabaut (National Membership & Post Activities Chairman), Training in a Box – Membership Development & Retention and Membership recruitment are just a few topics that are available.

Magic Wand: Sorry no magic wand here. Just hard work, knowing where to look. The membership team will be providing you with the information and the tools for another great year. We will also be creating membership teams in each of the 9 Districts. More info coming to the District Commanders soon.

Kudos: To all the Districts and Posts, very encouraging new membership numbers, and the Department's overall retention numbers being a full .5% above national avg, shows momentum as we further distance ourselves from the pandemic. Great job from everyone. Let's continue this growth and have a great year to come.

Cherry Valley Post 443 triumphed over Post 117 Framingham 6-1 on Tuesday.

Post 117 Framingham got on the board in the first inning after #4 singled, scoring one run.

Chloe Tuttle singled, helping Cherry Valley Post 443 tie the game at one in the bottom of the third.

In the bottom of the fifth, Cherry Valley Post 443 broke up the tie when Tuttle singled, scoring two runs. Then a line out by Ava Lamothe followed to extend the lead to 6-1.

Erin Connor led things off in the circle for Cherry Valley Post 443. She allowed three hits and one run (zero earned) over three innings, striking out four and walking three. Mia Manca threw three innings of scoreless ball for Cherry Valley Post 443 in relief, allowing zero hits, striking out nine, and walking two.

Cherry Valley Post 443 accumulated nine hits in the game. Grace Dias and Tuttle were a force together in the lineup, as they each collected two hits for Cherry Valley Post 443 while hitting back-to-back. Tuttle led Cherry Valley Post 443 with two runs batted in, going 2-for-2 on the day. Dias, Anna Diggins, and Ava Askren each stole multiple bases for Cherry Valley Post 443, stealing a total of eight bases in the game.

#4, #1, and #3 each collected one hit for Post 117 Framingham. #4 went 1-for-3 at the plate and led the team with one run batted in. #9 led Post 117 Framingham with two walks. Overall, the team had a strong eye at the plate, piling up five walks for the game.

EGION How to request ceremonial rifles



American Legion posts in good standing can request ceremonial rifles. These rifles are property of the U.S. Army and are only on loan to posts. All information pertaining to ceremonial rifles, including the storage of, requests forms, damaged or unserviceable rifles and more, is found on page 115 of The American Legion's Post Officer's Guide.

To request ceremonial post rifle(s), ammunition or surplus military equipment:

<u>Complete this form</u>. Please note that only a post commander or post adjutant may submit this request. The request form requires a physical address (not a

P.O. Box number), a telephone number, a contact person, the number of active members, and the post commander's or adjutant's signature. The recipient must be a person, not a place of business. State the number of rifles desired, up to a maximum of 15. Failure to include any requirement will result in the letter of request being returned to the post.

1. **Forward the form to your department headquarters**, Attn: Department Adjutant. All requests for surplus military equipment must first go through your department headquarters to verify the legitimacy of the post making the request. Your department headquarters will forward the completed and approved form to the National Security Division at The American Legion's Washington, D.C., office.

To request clips, download the form. To request blanks, download the form.

It is important to provide the request form to your department headquarters and not the U.S. Army TA-COM as that will only delay the process.

Once TACOM receives the properly endorsed request provided by The American Legion's Washington office, processing will begin and an eligibility package will be sent to the post. The package will include the checklist and forms required for completion by the post commander or adjutant. Return the original forms to TACOM. At this time, it takes approximately 90 days for rifles to be shipped after receipt of the eligibility requirements from the post. Currently, TACOM only issues M-1 Garand rifles. The U.S. Army TACOM website, <u>tacom.army.mil/ilsc/donations</u>, is a good source for questions on the military weapons and equipment program.

EGION Legion Calls for swift passage of Dole Act



The American Legion was one of several veteran service organizations who gathered in Washington, D.C., today to urge passage of H.R. 8371, the Senator Elizabeth Dole 21st Century Veterans Healthcare and Benefits Improvement Act.

Chanin Nuntavong, executive director of The American Legion's Government Affairs Office in Washington, D.C., joined with former Sen. Dole, as well as representatives from the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Wounded Warrior Project, Paralyzed Veterans of America, Disabled Ameri-

can Veterans, Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS), Military Officers Association of America and the National Coalition for Homeless Veterans. All of the participants called for passage of H.R. 8371, with Nuntavong opening his remarks focused on how the legislation can benefit rural veterans.

Nuntavong shared the story of Dan and Jeri McKeaney, who were in a motorcycle accident while riding with the local chapter of their Marine Riders Group. Both were transported to a hospital by Emergency Air Medical Services (EMS), which Dan credited with saving his life.

"He credits the extraordinary pre-hospital care from the EMS team and believes he's alive today because of them," Nuntavong said. "Section 143 (of the bill) ensures that rural air ambulance services receive the funding they need to continue offering these vital, lifesaving services.

"This bill will also strengthen rural America. Rural veterans encounter distinct challenges in accessing healthcare. In an emergency, every minute counts, which is why Emergency Air Medical Services can make the difference between life and death."

Other key provisions of the Senator Elizabeth Dole 21st Century Veterans Healthcare and Benefits Improvement Act include:

• Increasing Home-Based Care Resources. Expands access to home- and community-based services at every VA medical center, which would provide severely ill and aging veterans with more and better options to receive their care at home rather than in institutions.

• **Improving Access to Care.** Helps ensure that decisions between veterans and their VA providers about seeking care in the community are honored. Enhances access to critical residential rehabilitation treatment programs for mental health and substance use disorder treatment.

• **Honoring the Fallen.** Expands education benefits for surviving families. Removes archaic language that penalizes surviving spouses from moving forward after their loss.

• **Supporting Homeless Veterans.** Raises the grant and per-diem rate for veteran homelessness providers who partner with VA and provide rideshares to veterans for medical, housing and employment appointments and ensure veterans can get the resources they need to be lifted out of homelessness.

• **Caring for Caregivers.** Creates mental health care grants for certain caregivers who become strained by the demands of providing help and support to veterans with heightened needs. Provides a pathway to advocacy for organizations to provide veteran families support navigating VA's caregiver and long-term care services.

"We also advocate for veterans' right to choose where they spend their final days," Nuntavong said. "Currently, the VA provides burial support only if the veteran passes on VA property. Section 30, known as Gerald's Law, aims to extend this benefit to veterans who wish to spend their remaining time at home. Named after Gerald Elliott, a proud Legionnaire, this section honors his story.

"Gerald, like many veterans, faced the choice between spending his final days in a hospital or at home with his family. He chose home, but due to an obscure federal regulation, his family did not receive VA support. This change seeks to rectify such situations, ensuring that all veterans and their families receive the support they deserve."

Nuntavong also pointed out the education and employment component of H.R. 8371 and the negative impact of failing to pass the legislation. "H.R. 8371 puts veterans to work," he said. "In the past five years, 14,000 women and men have graduated from the Veteran Employment Through Technology Education Courses (VET-TEC) program. VET-TEC has provided these veterans with the skills and knowledge to compete for in-demand tech sector careers. In addition, graduates reported salaries that can support them and their families. Without Section 102, VET-TEC would be shuttered."

Dole also spoke, calling for a sense of urgency from Congress. "Like all bipartisan initiatives, each side was asked to make some sacrifices. Now, the time has come to move this bill forward and deliver all its promises," she said. "The resources, reforms and improvements contained in this legislation are precisely the types of advances that only Congress can provide. And I don't see how we can truly care for our veteran community if we wait another day to get it passed.


"For all those who have served and all those considering service in the future, this is a moment to show that we can put politics aside, even when it's an election year, and come together to perform a most noble responsibility: to care for all who have borne the battle. Bring this bill to the floor now."

Nuntavong closed by offering a frank message about the importance of passing H.R. 8371. "If the Senator Elizabeth Dole 21st Century Veterans Healthcare and Benefits Improvement Act is not passed, all the programs we have discussed today are in jeopardy," he said. "Veterans and their families and caregivers will see reduced health-care services and reduced employment opportunities."














LEGION Around the Department—Middleboro Post 64


