PNC Comer honored by National Executive Committee

A U.S. Air Force veteran of the Korean War who had been aware in advance of nearly every resolution to come before The American Legion National Executive Committee over the last half-century had no idea about this one.

American Legion Past National Commander John P. "Jake" Comer of Massachusetts wiped tears from his eyes Monday when he stepped to the podium of the Pre-NEC meeting at the organization's 105th National Convention, in New Orleans. The NEC had just passed Resolution 1, its only resolution heading into the convention, to name the historic NEC Room at The American Legion National Headquarters in his honor.

Three past national commanders — Paul Morin, David Rehbein and Daniel Dellinger — spoke to the committee about

the impact of Comer's mentorship to them. "I would not be standing here before you today if not for Jake Comer," said Morin, a fellow Massachusetts Legionnaire, who served as national commander in 2006 and 2007.

Comer joined The American Legion in 1962 and held offices at every level of the organization, serving as national commander in 1987 and 1988. That year, he was appointed by President Ronald Reagan to travel to Nicaragua and return with a report on the Contras and deliver it directly back to him. He raised more than \$1.1 million for the American Legion Child Welfare Foundation and more than \$1 million for the Korean War Memorial in Washington, D.C. He was later instrumental in the move to establish a permanent home for the American Legion Baseball World Series in Shelby, N.C.

Moreover, according to a plaque that will hang in the NEC Room now bearing his name, "he devoted more than three decades to mentoring leaders at every level of The American Legion."

For generations of Legionnaires who will vote on resolutions in decades to come, Comer's name and legacy will be etched into the architecture of a room in Indianapolis where all resolutions – *except one* – have received his counsel for more than four decades: The John P. "Jake" Comer National Executive Committee Room.

Loyalty. Unity. Valor

As he stood on the stage of the Ernest N. Morial Convention Center in New Orleans addressing delegates to the 105th American Legion National Convention, newly elected National Commander James A. LaCoursiere Jr. pledged to continue to maintain the mission of the organization's Bethe One veteran suicide prevention program, and raise funds for the Veterans & Children Foundation. "You don't fix something that's not broken," he said, referencing the work done before him by Past National Commanders James

Troiola and Daniel Seehafer. "We're going to maintain the course and follow the consistency that has been set."

And then he introduced what he called his personal and secondary theme: L.U.V., or Loyalty, Unity and Valor.

"The L is the loyalty, the true compassion from the heart," LaCoursiere said. "But the unity is when we all pull together, we all work as one, for one mission. And that's to drive our organization forward, which also enhances America for the better.

"The valor ... we carry that with us in our hearts. And we sit back and we maintain that from the day we raise our hand to serve this great country and still do that today. That's why you all are here. You do that back home with your posts, your units, your squadrons. And for that, I sincerely thank you."

A U.S. Air Force veteran and member of American Legion Post 91 in Moosup, Conn., LaCoursiere then shifted to suicide prevention, noting that Be the One "is a very meaningful and personal program and project to me. Be the One, as you heard, is not a slogan, not a catch phrase. It's not just something that looks nice on a billboard or anything such as that, but rather a direct mission statement. Far too many veterans have lost their lives due to suicide, as well as our active-duty troops and members of military families.

"As Commander Seehafer always stated, 'We, The American Legion, are about changing lives and saving lives.' Together, we can reduce the veteran suicide rate and destigmatize the issues of mental health. Together, we want to train and educate members within our great organization and in our communities about what the Be the One mission is all about."

That includes letting individuals know that it's OK to not be OK. "We, The American Legion, are there for them. We need to listen, be compassionate, ask the difficult questions and give them the guidance in which they need," LaCoursiere said. "When I get the honor of testifying before Congress, I want to be able to look Congress in the eyes and let them know that The American Legion has trained and educated more individuals than any other organization in the world."

Sending the right message about what The American Legion is and does is another focus for the new national commander.

"We need to make every community in the nation know and understand who we are. We are The American Legion," LaCoursiere said. "The second word ... is American. This says we represent all of America's veterans, our active duty, Guard and reserves, and their families as well. Legion is all of us united together as a family striving for the same goals: to keep the United States of America prospering and keep the promise for a stronger country through our youth, our voices in Congress, and striving for the much-deserved quality of life for all those that have served before and continuing today in our armed forces, along with their families. Do not forget the families.

"We need to go beyond the four walls of our post homes and the locations where we meet to become much more visible in every community throughout our great nation, as well as the foreign outlying departments. We do so much great work for our organization and for our great country, but we still are not identified enough as I feel we should be. Together, let's let all of America know that we are The American Legion, we are supporting veterans and their families, as we continue our service by serving America, through changing lives and saving lives. The world will know that The American Legion *is* the voice for veterans."

LaCoursiere called for continued, and improved, legislative advocacy from the Legion Family. "We need to continue to make our voices heard in our communities, states and on Capitol Hill," he said. "We have a fantastic grassroots program and constantly have the tools and resources at your fingertips, but in my opinion, we need a hell of a lot more of our Legion Family members to utilize the resources. I encourage – no, actually, the challenge was placed yesterday by Commander Seehafer, when he asked you all to take a brief moment, if you have not done so yet, to register for the Legislative Action Alerts by registering at **legion.org/action**, and respond to them regularly by sending messages to Congress on a regular and frequent basis.

"Make our voices heard, and let's make our members and our numbers show ... especially when we have crucial matters on the table before them, such as The Elizabeth Dole Act supporting our caregivers; the Major Richard Star Act allowing combat-injured veterans to receive both their earned retirement pay and disability compensation without offset; Pay The Coast Guard, ensuring the Coast Guard receives their earned pay during a government shutdown; and numerous other hot-button issues on behalf of our troops, veterans and families."

LaCoursiere closed by reminding Legionnaires of a promise he made this summer to Legionnaires during the annual National Membership Workshop – one that's about having fun.

"I promised everybody that if we all work together and hit the 100-percent mark by the Membership Workshop in 2025, that I, along with my aide, will appear on the stage at the workshop and a brief appearance at the national convention dressed up as cheerleaders.

"I'm cheering for all of you and am committed to working with you, as we grow our organization and let America know who we are – we are The American Legion. The voice for veterans and their families. Thank you, and God bless each and every one of you, and God bless the United States of America."



Meet the new Auxiliary President



Trish Ward was elected national president of the American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) during the organization's 103rd National Convention held Aug. 23-29 in New Orleans.

"I stand before you today incredibly honored to have been elected to the position of national president for the 2024-2025 administrative year and I thank you deeply and genuinely for your support and confidence," Ward said from the convention stage. "As a dedicated and committed member of this organization, it's hard for me to express the emotion of this moment. The upcoming membership renewal cutoff date is 11 September. That means, any renewals not processed by that date, the member will receive a 2nd notice to renew. Sooooo please process all membership renewals you have in your possession, to minimize members getting a second notice, and making duplicate payments.

Paid on Line: All to often, Department gets phone calls "Can you tell me how many of my Post members paid on-line"? This information is readily available, for Commanders, Adjutants and "permission assigned" Membership Chair's, on MyLegion.org. Log on to MyLegion, click on My Account, click on Reports/Labels, then Member Online Renewals - pick your parameters, and their you go. If you cannot "see" the prompts, you may not have permissions, did you turn in your Commanders and Adjutant Report?

462 Post: This is our "cloud" of members, most know what it is and how it works. I will be sending this list out, want to get on an exclusive e-mail list, send me a note. Prepared as an Excel spreadsheet, it will be distributed to your District Membership Team (DMT). The DMT's are being requested to send it to their Posts. Take a look for potential new members not only in your community, but surrounding cities and towns as well.

Membership Sources: Log onto Studentveterans.org, this is the Student Veterans of America group. Log in, search for chapters in Massachusetts (Hint: There are 15 chapters in the Commonwealth) and engage. Send the SVA chapter an e-mail. Something to consider, almost all of the members are using the G.I Bill. Who authored the "Serviceman's Readjustment Act" of 1944? Your right.

The Snowbirds are Coming: Massachusetts enjoys a large number of transient "Snowbirds" that head south for the Winter. We know who they are, if the member has not renewed, reach out to them and highly suggest that they renew before they go. A nice new 2025 membership card will help them get into the southern Posts in January, a bit easier.

Tool Bag: Been working on your elevator pitch? Have you taken Basic Training? Many, many tools are available to help the Membership Teams at all levels. **MyLegion.org** - reports/ labels has letters you can use to send to members. **legion.org/training** has a tremendous library of materials you can use, not just to look for members, but how to welcome them once you have them. It prevents eviction, keeps the power on and fulfills basic needs to hold a family together through difficult times.

The foundation also covers rigorous training and accreditation costs for American Legion claims experts who provide free representation for veterans and families applying for disability benefits, survivor assistance, GI Bill opportunities and more.

Since its inception in 1925 as the American Legion Endowment Fund, the foundation has assisted millions of veterans, their families and children in need. In 2019, the American Legion Endowment Fund began doing business as the American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation to more clearly state who benefits from tax-deductible donations to the separate non-profit 501c3 element of the nation's largest veterans organization.

The foundation relies entirely on charitable donations from individuals, like-minded associations and corporate allies.

At any one time, more than 3,000 trained and accredited American Legion service officers are handling the needs of 750,000 or more U.S. military veterans who have become disabled through service to our nation, as well as their families, who may be caregivers, surviving spouses or dependent children.

The American Legion Temporary Financial Assistance program ensures that qualified military and veteran families with minor children at home can pay for food, shelter, clothing or other necessities when sudden, unexpected financial hardships strike. The program distributes between \$250,000 and \$1.2 million each year in one-time cash grants of up to \$1,500 each.

Veterans & Children Foundation: Key Points

The American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation, formerly known as The American Legion Endowment Fund, provides financial resources for the organization's Temporary Financial Assistance Program and Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation support, including training for accredited service officers.

The Temporary Financial Assistance Program helps military and veteran families with minor children at home when they are hit with unexpected financial hardships, from sudden health-care emergencies to delayed military pay. Funds are disbursed as cash grants solely to be used for essential household costs.

Over \$6 million in Temporary Financial Assistance grants has been provided over the last decade alone.

More than 3,000 trained American Legion service officers provide VA benefits representation and other forms of assistance to some 750,000 veterans at any one time, all the time, free of charge.

American Legion service officers are directly responsible for veterans disability compensation of more than \$14 billion per year.

The need for more service officers, and more accreditation training, is essential as a new generation of wartime veterans returns to civilian life and becomes eligible for state and federal disability and health-care services and benefits.

The American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation has provided tens of millions of dollars for disabled veterans and families since 1925, and funds must now be replenished in order to continue making life-changing differences in their lives.

Charitable gifts to the American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation are 100% taxdeductible because the foundation is its own 501c3.

Donors who make substantial contributions to the foundation may be recognized as members of the prestigious 1919 Society.

The American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation is carefully governed by its own nonprofit endowment corporation, led by the national commander of The American Legion.

American Legion Sponsoring Army-Navy Game



The American Legion is proud to announce an official partnership with the Army-Navy Football Game presented by USAA, which will be played for the 125th time on Dec. 14, 2024. The American Legion becomes the first veterans service organization (VSO) to sponsor "America's Game" in its history.

The American Legion, the nation's largest veterans service organization, has secured a multi-year deal alongside presenting sponsor USAA

and participating partners Chevrolet, Exchange, Duke Cannon Supply Co. and Palantir. The American Legion will also be participating in year-round sponsorships of both Army West Point Athletics and Navy Athletics. The agreement starts with this year's game at Commanders Field in Landover, Md., and helps The American Legion raise awareness about its Be the One mission to reduce the number of veterans and servicemembers lost to suicide.

"We are going to amplify our Be the One Mission by being official partners of the Army-Navy Game presented by USAA," American Legion National Commander Daniel Seehafer said on the stage of the 2024 American Legion National Convention in New Orleans. "Your American Legion has become the very first VSO to sponsor America's Game."

"As the nation's largest VSO, it is fitting for The American Legion to be at this annual celebration of service, honor, country," American Legion Chief Marketing Officer Dean Kessel said. "We are truly honored to support these student-athletes who are committed to protecting the freedoms we cherish."

The Army-Navy Game is among the longest standing and most storied rivalries in college football history. This new partnership aligns with the Legion's core values of service, patriotism and camaraderie.

Chet Gladchuk, Director of Athletics at the U.S. Naval Academy, said: "The opportunity to enhance our relationship with The American Legion is so very much appreciated. As partners, we share common values that accentuate country and patriotism. America's Game will only further promote our shared vision and mutual support for those veterans who have advanced the cause of our great nation."

Mike Buddie, Director of Athletics at Army West Point, said: "We are thrilled to partner with The American Legion as our official veteran service organization. This collaboration will continue to elevate America's game on the national stage and showcase the incredible support The American Legion provides to our veteran servicemembers."

The sponsorship also allows The American Legion to raise awareness about Be the One.

"While we know the game will provide our nation's veterans and other fans entertainment, it's also true that many are suffering inside," Kessel said. "That's why it is so important for us to bring Be the One to millions of military supporters. By raising awareness of the suicide crisis in forums like this, we are effectively increasing the probability of servicemembers, veterans, their families and other military supporters to Be the One to save one life."

Post hoping gaming can serve as a "Stepping Stone" for younger veterans in the Legion



Prior to becoming a member of The American Legion, Army National Guard veteran Joseph Desroches saw a post on Facebook in which Wilson-Thompson American Legion Post 185 in Feeding Hills, Mass., announced it was setting up a gaming area within the post and was looking for game donations.

Desroches, 33, wanted to assist the post's effort, so he reached out and shared that he had some contacts within the gaming community – primarily the nonprofit Stack Up, which was founded to bring veterans and civilian supporters together through a shared love of video gaming through a variety of programs.

Desroches, who shortly thereafter joined Post 185, reached out to Stack Up, which has had multiple collaborations with both the Legion's National Headquarters and local posts.

"I got a response back within a couple days, saying 'We'd love to help out,'" Desroches said. "They asked if there was any specific equipment we were looking for. I told them anything would be a benefit and we'd be grateful for.

"They ended up sending us the latest Xbox system and a whole handful of games. Some accessories as well. They were very quick to jump in on helping out."

The American Legion has provided Operation Comfort Warrior grants to Stack Up in the past to cover such expenses as <u>updating Joint Base Lewis-McChord's gaming area</u> and <u>providing video games and other accessories</u> for Fort Irwin's Desert Warrior Week. Stack Up also <u>gifted four gaming PCs to American Legion Post</u> 46 in Culver City, Calif., which was planning on using them to start an esports league. (*Continued on Page 15*)

On its <u>website</u>, Stack Up shared, "We've helped a few American Legion Posts before by getting them Supply Crates. American Legion Posts often lack gaming areas and equipment and with more and more Veterans gaming, they need to update their systems. We're happy to help provide these consoles as the American Legion has benefitted Stack Up through its Operation Comfort Warriors before to help us get more Supply Crates into the hands of Veterans."

"I think it's huge," Desroches said of the Legion's relationship with Stack Up. "It definitely offers a place for people to go and relax, unwind, decompress and hang out with others. We have a little gaming corner (at Post 185) off to the side with couches. I figure it's going to make a big impact, especially with drawing some of the younger crowd in. Having something like that is kind of a stepping stone, bridging the gap of making some of the younger crowd not sure how to get involved. I think that's going to be a big help."

Desroches said he's been gaming "since I was little" and said when he was in detainee operations at Guantanamo Bay, it served as a coping mechanism for he and others.

"Gaming gives you that opportunity to connect or reconnect with new people from all over the world," he said. "I think it's just another tool in the toolbox kind of thing. You don't have to travel to do it. You can sit down, jump on a game, message some people.

"Online gaming is ease of access to talk to like-minded people, unwind, game and chat it up. And get things off your chest if you need to."

That includes what can be difficult topics. "Maybe it's not something you can easily talk to your family about," Desroches said. "My post commander, Drew Pajack, he's trying to do a lot of this stuff. He wants to really expand this, and hopefully we can work with other posts and kind of show them, 'Hey, this is what we've been doing' and see how we can help as well.

"It's not just to benefit our post. It's really to set a standard or a waypoint for other people to jump on board. That's the long-term goal."





100-mile relay for CWF

Two years ago, Legionnaire Mitchell Keil organized a 100-mile relay from his Post 125 in North Adams, Mass., to Post 414 in Sutton, Mass., in support of the American Legion's Veterans & Children Foundation. Keil and many of the same walkers — Post 125 Legion Family members and friends — recently set out for another 100 miles to support the Legion's Child Welfare Foundation (CWF) which provides grants to nonprofits that contribute to the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual welfare of children.



The walkers and support vehicles left Post 125 at 6 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 2, and arrived to Post 306 in Paxton, Mass., on Sunday, Aug. 4, after making an overnight stop.

Dressed in bright yellow Child Welfare Foundation shirts, the walkers were visible to passersby to share the message of CWF and raise funds along the way. Keil believes the total raised for CWF is about \$10,000. Money raised is the result of donations for the walk and 50/50 raffles throughout the past year at Post 125.

"Every time we do an event at Post 125, we do a 50/50 and instead of taking that 50 and putting it into the general fund, we specifically put it aside for this (CWF fundraiser)," said Keil, a post service officer and the Department of Massachusetts historian. "We've learned to not just put it toward everything that we're working on, but to let it accumulate and give it a specific goal. And we tell people exactly what the 50/50 is being raised for."

Post 125 chose to walk for CWF because it was the fundraising project for immediate Past Department Commander Sandra Davis. And the post knows how to successfully fundraise for the cause as it's received the CWF 100% Per Capita Banner the past four years.

"Not only am I proud that we were able to do the walk and raise that much money, but that the community was really behind us the whole time we were doing it," Keil said.

Along the route, the walkers encountered heat, humidity and downpour rain; walked in the dark with the support vehicles' lights illuminating them; got lost on river walks; shared camaraderie and listened to music or audible books; enjoyed a hearty breakfast at Post 124 in Westfield Sunday morning; and was escorted by the Paxton police and fire department to their final destination of Post 306 where they celebrated with a meal.

"(The walk) definitely wasn't without its hiccups," said Keil, "but we had a lot of fun."

Keil plans to do the 100-mile relay again in 2026 with a goal to visit a new department. He has mapped out posts that are about 100 miles away in Middlebury, Vt., Cooperstown, N.Y, and Danbury, Conn.

"We're trying to see if there's going to be any interest to receive us in another department," Keil said.




