How the Boy Scouts are Boosting American Legion's Community Presence.

The American Legion, a cornerstone of veteran advocacy and service in the United States, has long been dedicated to supporting veterans, promoting patriotism, and engaging communities. In recent years, one of the organization's strategic goals has been to increase its presence and relevance within local communities, and a key partner in this effort is the Boy Scouts of America (BSA).

The Boy Scouts, known for their emphasis on leader-ship, civic responsibility, and community service, share a mission closely aligned with that of the American Legion. Together, these two organizations are working to foster a stronger sense of service, patriotism, and community engagement, while also ensuring that younger generations are connected to and supportive of veteran causes.

Strengthening the Bond Between Two Iconic Organizations

The American Legion and the Boy Scouts have enjoyed a long-standing relationship, dating back to 1919 when the Legion became one of the first organizations to charter Scout troops. Today, more than 2,500 Scouting units are sponsored by American Legion posts across the country.

However, this collaboration is being renewed and expanded, with a sharper focus on how the Scouts can actively increase the Legion's visibility and impact in local communities.

By working together, the two organizations leverage their shared values and large, multi-generational membership bases. The Scouts, through their civic-oriented programs, provide the manpower and youthful energy needed for community service projects, while the Legion offers leadership, mentorship, and access to veteran networks that can inspire young people and deepen their understanding of national service.

Community Service Projects

One of the most tangible ways that the Boy Scouts are helping to increase the American Legion's community presence is through joint community service projects. American Legion National Commander LaCoursiere Jr. spoke to members of the National Executive Committee during Fall Meetings about pressing topics such as natural disasters, the Middle East and VA funding.

Hurricanes, the anniversary of a surprise attack, 44,500 emails, election year and membership. These were topics that American Legion National Commander James LaCoursiere Jr. addressed to members of the National Executive Committee and other national leadership Wednesday morning during Fall Meetings in Indianapolis

As Hurricane Helene and flooding devastated parts of Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Georgia, residents in Florida brace for Hurricane Milton. LaCoursiere shared a reminder that The American Legion stands ready to assist Legion members and posts, and Sons of The American Legion members, impacted by the hurricanes with National Emergency Fund grants. Temporary Financial Assistance grants, which help Legion members and active duty servicemembers with minor child(ren) in the home, are also available at the local post or department level.

"Keep in mind that we are truly an American Legion Family, and we are there for you – hearts, minds, prayers and physically, we are there for you," LaCoursiere said. "The Legion will continue to do what they have always done during emergencies like these. They will put service before self. They will gather supplies, collect donations and give to the areas that are hurting."

Monday marked the one-year anniversary of the deadly attack on Israel by Hamas; the battle continues in the Middle East. Since the attacks, Iran has launched hundreds of ballistic missiles toward Israel. As a result, an estimated 43,000 U.S. troops and at least a dozen warships are currently deployed to the region, though some were there prior to last year's attack.

"The American Legion will always believe in defending America's interests but, at the same time, we understand the need to avoid unnecessary or poorly planned combat deployments," LaCoursiere said. "Mission objectives and exit strategies must be clear to avoid escalations that could lead to our troops being bogged down in another forever war. Regardless of the policies or circumstances behind any military mission, The American Legion will always and unequivocally support the men and women who are sent in harm's way."

Support for troops also means supporting their needs after the uniform comes off. A \$3 billion stopgap was required a few weeks ago so the Department of Veterans Affairs could continue funding veteran service-connected payments.

The American Legion joined with other VSOs in calling for Congress to immediately fund a \$15-billion VA budget shortfall, and more than 44,500 emails were sent to Congress through our <u>legislative action web page</u>.

"This is just the latest instance of The American Legion being the voice for veterans," he said.

A presidential election is less than a month away and LaCoursiere read Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution of The American Legion: "The American Legion shall be absolutely nonpolitical and shall not be used for the dissemination of partisan principles nor the promotion of the candidacy of any person seeking office or preferment."

"Our neutrality when it comes to elections is not only mandated by our constitution but serves us well in a practical sense," he said. "It's the reason why The American Legion works well with Democrats, Republicans and Independents in Congress. The fact is, nearly every successful veteran's bill of consequence has had bipartisan support. Our nonpartisanship also helps us maintain a productive relationship with the White House, regardless of which party is in the Oval Office.

"At the same time, we want veterans to vote. Veterans have fought for, and in many cases, died for this constitutional right. Let's get out the vote."

LaCoursiere's goal for new traditional members recruited into posts for 2025 is 75,000. He will reward his Be the One dog tag coin to any Legionnaire who recruits three new members into The American Legion who was not a member in 2024. And his retention goal is 90%.

"I truly believe that the more people learn about The American Legion, see our programs in action, and understand the power we have in setting public policy – the more they will want to join us and the more they will want to stay."

In closing, LaCoursiere thanked NEC members for keeping the Legion's suicide prevention mission, Be the One, at the forefront and for supporting the Veterans and Children Foundation through donations.

"My primary focus is quality of life for all of our veterans and their families. We need to be more engaged with the communities to allow the communities to see and believe in The American Legion. Let's let America know who The American Legion is."

Simple request from your adjutant and membership coordinator regarding Department Banquets, Testimonials, and Parties that have booster sheets, ads, and tickets please, please make out the checks separately. Each goes into a different accounts. It is difficult to keep track accurately if the office has to divide your checks.

Chain of command, we are all past military and understand the concept. If your Post has an issue your first line in your chain of command is your District Commander. Any and all complaints received by the Department or the National Organization is sent right back to the District Commanders. Efficiency is a beautiful thing. Let us all be more efficient and use the structure already in place to handle issues. Problems get solved quicker that way. If a person makes a complaint it must be in WRITING and SIGNED! Or it goes in the Adjutant's filing system.

Forms, forms, forms, forms, forms, forms, forms, yes forms. We still have Posts that have not turned in their forms. Posts will be precluded from Department awards if Post forms are not turned in. I hate to see a Post that deserves an award not receive one because they have not turned in a form.

There seems to be confusion regarding Calendar Year and Membership Year. Calendar year is January 1st to December 31st. Legion Membership Year is July 1st to June 30th. Why is this important? See below.

Article 7 Section 4 states in The Department Constitution and By-Laws, "Election of all Post Officers shall be held before July 1st, and the Post Commander, as the Post shall prescribe, shall appoint such other officers before July 1st, and the Department Adjutant shall be notified, of all officers on or before July 15th." All Posts that have elections after July 1st are in violation of our Department Constitution & By-Laws. Why this is important? FORMS and COMMUNICATION. Department & District Officers cannot plan their visits if they don't know when Posts meets. Department cannot contact a Post with questions or issues such as correct addresses for PUFL checks and if we don't know have the most current information. Which is found on what? THE FORMS.

Posts need to make every attempt to send a representative to their respected District meetings. This is where the information concerning the Legion is shared. We cannot share it if you are not there. Posts call constantly saying "I didn't know that". Did you go to your District Meeting?



Claudius G. Pendill was born May 12th, 1891, in Marquette, Michigan. He graduated from Northern Michigan University, Marquette in 1911. He married Gertrude E. Wollaeger on September 17th, 1921. They had four children and thirteen grandchildren.

He enlisted as an apprentice seaman in the United States Navy on May 8th, 1917, at Great Lakes, IL. He served in the service during WWI, WWII, and Korea. He retired August 31st, 1951.

He established the "Claudius G. Pendill Trophy for Civic Achievement" for the Department of Wisconsin in 1930

He established the "Claudius G. Pendill Trophy for Community Service" in the department of Massachusetts in 1930

He was one of the first Scoutmasters in the United States with a troop in Racine, Wisconsin in 1916 until he entered the Navy.

He has been in Civic matters most of his life and especially has served "The Anna Jacques Hospital in Newbury port as president of the board of trustees since 1955.

Claudius and Gertrude lived in Newbury port since 1924 and since October 1st, 1927, in the same house at 44 Broad Street which was said to have been built in 1797.

(Therefore, to prevent embarrassment, it shall be incumbent upon the recommending Post to report the ineligibility of the individual prior to the Department Convention.) This is the only restriction.

NOMINATION PROCEDURE: Any post, District or County may recommend any qualified member. Submissions should include this form (reverse side completed) and supporting documents as necessary for the committee to judge the qualifications, character and dedication of the nominee. **Nominee should be present at the Department Convention.**

Supporting documents MUST be included: They may include letters from civic groups, churches, other veteran organization; testimonials form fellow veterans, news clippings, etc.

DEADLINES: Blue Cap/Legionnaire Committee Chairman must receive <u>submissions no later</u> than April 15, 2025.

FINAL SELECTION OF one Department of Massachusetts BLUE CAP/LEGIONNAIRE OF THE YEAR will be determined by the Legionnaire of the year Committee <u>no later than May 1, 2025</u>. There will be no honorable mentions. The winner will receive a plaque and Legion cap.

WINNER will be honored and a guest of the Massachusetts American Legion State Convention in **2026**.

Please remember:

- Only department adjutants can access and upload material to the contest website.
- Submissions are to be a single PDF file not to exceed 50MB in size (smaller files are preferred).
- There is no certification form for digital entries since access to this site is limited to the department adjutant's credentials.
- Once a digital entry is successfully submitted, the department adjutant and National Headquarters will receive an email confirmation.
- Each department may enter one post history and one department history in the digital contest, and one post history in the physical contest.
- The national historian will appoint judges prior to the National Convention.
- Beginning in 2025, there will continue to be a digital department history contest. Physical and digital post histories will be showcased online and at National Convention.

LEGION National Emergency Fund Post Excellence Award

American Legion posts throughout our country go above and beyond the call of duty every year and particularly after natural disasters such as tornados, floods, hurricanes, and snowstorms. YouTube also has Past National Commander Seehafer's message to the 2 main presidential candidates, as neither attended our National Convention in New Orleans, LA this past August.

As noted previously, next year is the 100th anniversary of American Legion Baseball. There are currently 87 members of the Baseball Hall of Fame that played Legion Baseball. There will be a documentary, tookit, social media, a "bookazine "(similar to the one done for the Legion's 100th anniversary), displays and "shout outs" from Professional Baseball Players to note the occasion.

Two other items of note were the following: 1. Army vs Navy football game. The Legion is now a sponsor (5 year term) and the ONLY veterans service organization being allowed to do so at this time.

2. America 250. The American Legion is a member of the US Commission. The expectation is that a toolkit (to involve Flag and Civics education) will be forthcoming.

A Nationwide Call to Action Two Lights for Tomorrow April 18 – 19, 2025

What Is Two Lights for Tomorrow

Two Lights for Tomorrow is a nationwide initiative to commence the celebration of the 250th birthday of the United States of America. The famous ride of Paul Revere occurred on the overnight of April 18 – 19, 1775. Two Lights for Tomorrow commemorates that famous ride and uses the imagery of that shining light today as a uniting call to action for our citizens to celebrate and serve.

How to Participate, Part I

On April 18, 2025, we're calling for two lights to be displayed in every statehouse in the nation. They will be a reminder that the visual of a light shining out in the darkness on Revere's ride is not just something that mattered then; it's something that matters today, and for our collective tomorrow.

Some commissions are planning a public program as two lights are lit at the statehouse. This is an opportunity to not only raise public awareness of the upcoming 250th and how that visibly will be marked, but also to communicate the meaning of Revere's ride as history and remind our citizens of their part in the perpetual building of a "more perfect union."

How to Participate, Part II

The day following, states can promote a day of service on April 19th. At the community level, citizens will be called to serve their communities with volunteer projects ranging from park and cemetery clean-ups (especially with the close proximity to Earth Day) to community builds, food drives, and card writing to residents of care facilities, etc. The possibilies for service can be tailored to the needs of our citizens and in partnership with service organizations.

Projects Are Scalable for Communities and Individuals

From two spotlights at a state capitol building beaming in the darkness to smaller displays at municipal buildings, and lights in individual homes, every citizen can participate.

For state-level displays, there isn't a specific kind of light, duration of display, or location because we want it to be approachable and achievable for everyone given that each state-level commission will need to coordinate the approval processes within their own systems.

Some governor's offices are considering issuing executive orders to encourage government department buildings, municipalities, and every citizen to participate.

We encourage participation at as many locations as possible – community centers, municipal and county administrative buildings, and private residences.


