SAL Ends 2025 with New Membership Record

For the third consecutive year, the Sons of The American Legion set a new record for membership. 25 detachments also set all-time highs in membership.

The SAL finished 2025 with 404,941 members. That's a 1.94% increase over 2024's final membership of 397,243 members.

Since 1983, the first year of accurate membership numbers, the SAL membership has increased every year except two — in 2020 and 2021, during the Covid-19 pandemic.

When SAL membership surpassed the 400,000 mark in August, then-SAL National Commander Joseph Navarrete said, "Surpassing 400,000 members shows how much our generations, from our oldest member to our youngest, value the service and sacrifice our veterans have made so that we all can live free in the greatest nation in the world."

National Legion Family Gathers in Hawaii to remember Pearl Harbor Attacks

Many of the Hawaii American Legion Family, along with National Commander Dan Wiley, SAL National Commander Bill Clancy, and Auxiliary National President Pam Ray, plus their staff and families from the mainland, visited Hawaii on the dates surrounding the anniversary of the 1941 Pearl Harbor attacks. Legion Family members, plus active duty serviceman, Young Marines, National Park Service, and Pacific Historic Parks personnel participated in events on the 6th of December, including a Family Flying Flags for Heroes event and tours with the National Park Service of the Pearl Harbor National Memorial. They met inside the park behind the ticketing area, and planted 2,390 4"x6" flags within 2-and-a-half hours—recognizing the 2,390 military service members and civilians who lost their lives during the attacks on 07 December 1941. The following day, they also participated in the remembrance ceremonies.

Please also continue to let *The Millennium* know what's going on out there throughout the country—let us know about events your squadron runs, fundraisers you hold, and about how you as a Son are experiencing this rewarding experience of the SAL. A great

CPR / CSR's Available Now

The fillable 2025-2026 American Legion Consolidated Squadron Report (CSR) is now available on [legion.org](#) and in [myLegion](#). This form provides posts an opportunity to document external activities, such as volunteer hours, fundraising efforts, Be the One events, funeral honors, youth programs and more.

The reports can be updated throughout the year and finalized when complete. Submission deadline is July 1, 2026.

Adjutants can follow these steps to access the reports in MyLegion:

1. Begin in My Groups. The dashboard will display a link for consolidated reports.

2. Click "Edit Reports" or "View/Edit Reports" from the left menu. Then view dashboard. The dashboard with consolidated report options is restricted to post and squadron adjutants.

3. My Consolidated Post Reports window will open. This window provides information for open and closed reports. Click "Edit" to open the report.

4. Click "Edit" in Preview and Final Steps to open the report fields to enter data.

At the bottom of the form are buttons to "Save as Draft," "Next" or "Cancel."

SAL 100: Legacy Equals Strength

The Sons of The American Legion at Hamburg, New York has a rich and varied history. It began early in the chartering process back in 1936. The Hamburg area had a significant number of World War I veterans that started Post 527 right after the war. As a result those veterans reacclimated to civilian life and raised families, creating a ready body of recruits for the Sons organization. The Sons had a strong squadron of 141 members at the charter inception in 1936.

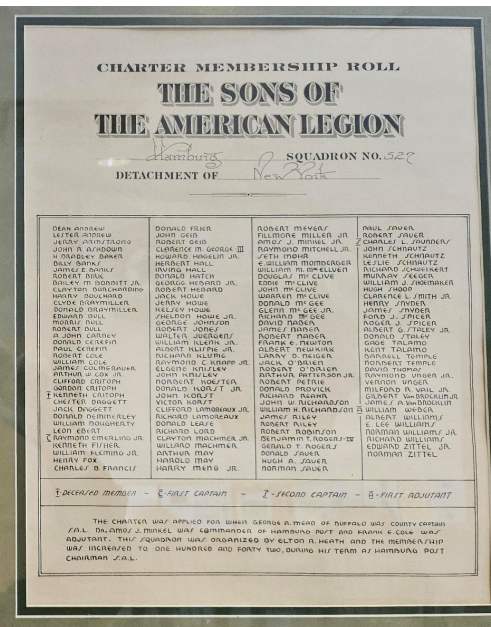
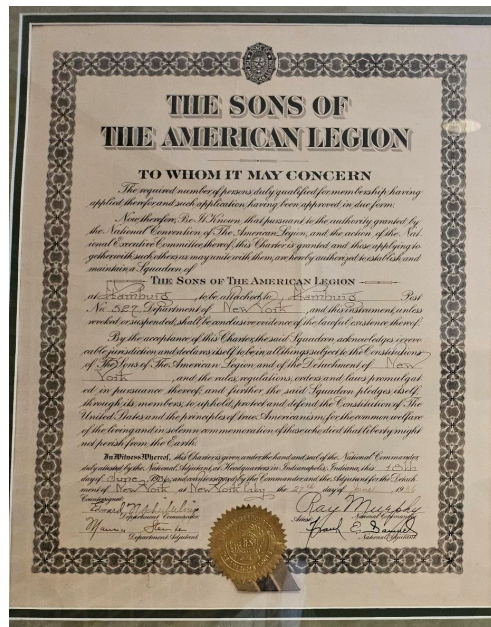
The very first SAL captain (commander) after serving in World War II, even became one of the Legion Post Commanders. This legacy was a solid force in securing the reputation of the Post becoming a local institution for family support and service.

Many of those Sons members became veterans when the call-up for World War II started. As a result, the squadron had a powerful past and a powerful future. The fact that many of those original chartered Sons members became veterans significantly affected the growth of the squadron after WWII. They knew what it was like to be a Sons member, even though they now were veterans ... they came back from WWII and strengthened the Post with their Legion membership, but also made sure that the Sons squadron would remain strong and viable as the Legion family grew.

Many Hamburg family names appear on this list - they are business owners and impactful people in the town even today, generations later.

This level of dual membership and organizational understanding helped to solidify that the Sons Squadron 527 would continue to impact the Post and community for many years to come.

Here is how it works ... Any SAL member (regular, dual, or triple) that recruits a NEW Legion member gets a polo shirt, courtesy of the Detachment of Kansas. The detachment pays for the shirts and the embroidery; on one side of the shirt, it is embroidered with "Got One For The Legion Family" and on the other side it is embroidered with the SAL logo/emblem. The shirts were designated to be a bright neon color for two reasons - when you know the program and see someone wearing the shirt, you know they signed up a new legion member. plus it is a great conversation starter for people unaware of the program. Host a Be The One Event in the New Year




American Legion posts are spreading the Be the One message through local events. According to the 2024-2025 Consolidated Post Report, there were 7,223 suicide-prevention events conducted by 2,917 posts in 2024-2025. These included 5K run/walks, in-person suicide prevention training for Legion Family and community members, displays at sporting events, and resource fairs with local suicide prevention experts and available support.

Start planning your Be the One event now, maybe even around the following dates:

- **March 9-15: Buddy Check Week, ending with the Legion's birthday**
- **May: Mental Health Awareness Month**
- **September: Suicide Prevention Awareness Month**
- **Nov. 9-15: Buddy Check Week, including Veterans Day**

If your post, district or department wants to host a Be the One event, go to betheone.org/resources for materials on how to get started:

- **How-to videos.** If you are coordinating an event for your post, district or department, two videos outline how to organize an event and engage the media.
- **Sample media advisory and press release.** Download the documents, update them with your event information, and distribute to local media, community partners and others.

Florida: Squadron's "Operation Remember Our Heroes" honors veterans; Volunteers place flags and markers at Sebastian-area gravesites

For more than a decade, Sons of The American Legion Squadron 189 has worked to ensure local veterans are never forgotten through its ongoing effort, Operation: Remember Our Heroes.

Launched in 2014, the program's mission is simple but meaningful: to identify and honor veterans' graves by placing a bronze military marker and an American flag at each site. Twice each year — on Memorial Day and Veterans Day — Squadron 189 members and community volunteers visit Brookside, Winter Beach and Sebastian cemeteries to replace worn flags and mark previously unidentified veterans' graves. Since October 2014, volunteers have placed more than 10,000 American flags across these cemeteries, a number that continues to grow as more veterans' graves are identified each year. Participants range from preschool-aged children to seniors, including church groups, sports teams and other local organizations.

"Operation Remember Our Heroes" was conceived by past squad commander Peter T. Puzzo, who said the effort reflects the community's gratitude to those who served.

"We believe that is not too much to offer these brave men and women who fought, and in some cases died, for our freedom and the way of life we choose," Puzzo said. The program is funded entirely through donations from individuals and local businesses. Jerry Smith Flooring & Design Center has served as a flagship sponsor for nine years, and squad members expressed gratitude for the continued support of businesses that invest in community causes.

On Tuesday December 9, 2025 Commander Barnes and the Legion Family came to the Paramus Home to dedicate the furniture and games. Santa and Mrs. Claus came with the Legion Family as well to visit the veterans—a good time was had by all.

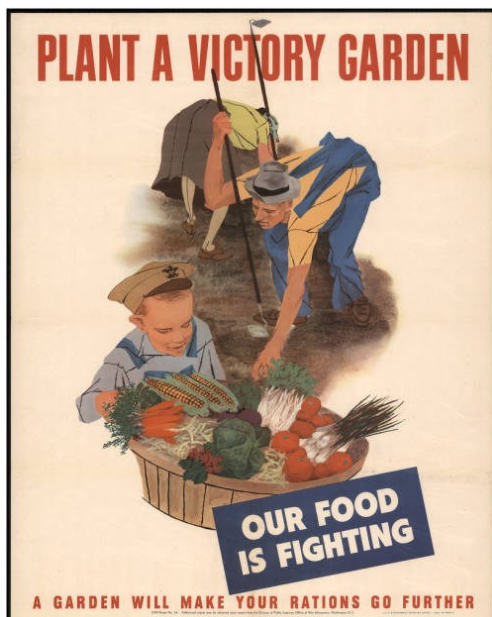

Victory Gardens: Growing Community

Victory Gardens hold an important place in American history. During both World Wars, families across the nation cultivated gardens in backyards, schoolyards, and shared spaces to support the war effort and strengthen their communities. At their peak, Victory Gardens produced nearly forty percent of the nation's vegetables. Beyond food production, they fostered self-reliance, reinforced family involvement, and united communities around a shared commitment to service.

Today, Victory Gardens are experiencing a renewed relevance. Rising food costs, environmental concerns, and an increased emphasis on local service have driven renewed interest in community-based gardening initiatives. Victory Gardens offer a practical, visible way to support families, promote sustainability, and provide meaningful opportunities for youth engagement—values that align closely with the mission of the Sons of the American Legion.

This renewed emphasis is supported by a National Sons of the American Legion directive, formally encouraging Squadrons nationwide to establish Victory Gardens as an official service initiative. The directive calls on Squadrons to participate in a shared

national effort that honors the organization's history while advancing youth involvement, veteran support, and community service. By adopting Victory Gardens, Squadrons demonstrate service in action through projects that are accessible, impactful, and adaptable to local needs.

One of the strengths of Victory Gardens is their ability to succeed across diverse regions. The USDA Plant Hardiness Zone system allows communities to tailor planting schedules to local climate conditions. Northern regions may focus on shorter growing seasons and early preparation, while southern states benefit from extended seasons and multiple planting cycles. Regardless of location, Victory Gardens are most successful when planning reflects regional conditions and available resources.

Across the country, Squadrons are translating this national initiative into local action. Underutilized spaces are being transformed into productive gardens that emphasize youth participation, sustainability, and service. Features such as raised beds improve accessibility and soil quality, rainwater collection promotes responsible water use, and creative solutions like vertical gardening maximize limited space while modeling resourcefulness.

Youth involvement remains a central benefit of Victory Gardens. Participation allows young people to learn where food comes from, develop responsibility, and experience the value of consistent effort. Gardening fosters problem-solving, teamwork, and patience while providing opportunities to work alongside veterans and adult mentors. These shared experiences strengthen intergenerational connections and reinforce the importance of service.

The benefits extend beyond education. Harvested produce supports Post activities and events, with surplus often shared with families or veterans in need. The gardens themselves serve as visible symbols of pride, cooperation, and service, reinforcing to young members that their contributions are meaningful and valued.

Victory Gardens grow more than food. They cultivate responsibility, confidence, and community connection. As Squadrons across the nation embrace this initiative, Victory Gardens reaffirm a timeless lesson of service: meaningful impact often begins

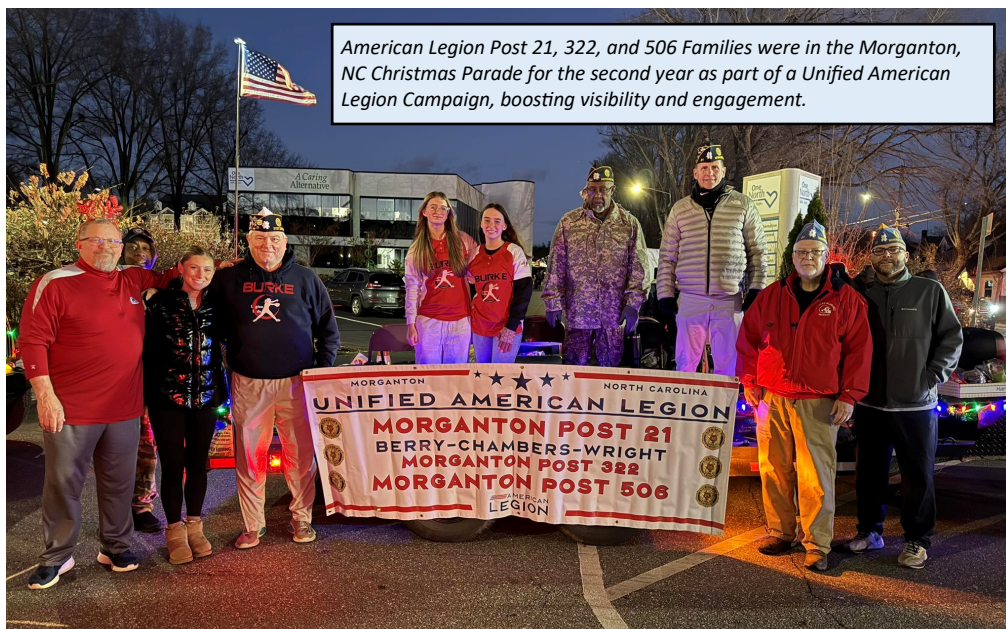

Florida: Squadron 129 spearheads a memorial honoring those who died in service in Korea and Vietnam

A project three years in the making, led by Sons of The American Legion Squadron 129 in Jacksonville Beach, Fla., pays tribute to local servicemembers who died in the Korean and Vietnam wars.

The memorials, which also honor those who died in America's undeclared wars, were unveiled Dec. 14 in front of Post 129.

"It is satisfying that we finally got it installed to memorialize the many servicemembers who served, their families — and especially those who paid the ultimate sacrifice during these armed conflicts and wars to protect our freedoms," said SAL member Dave Breitenstein.

Post 129 Treasurer Jim Wineland approached Squadron 129 member Brian Haught with the project in 2022, and Haught developed pillar designs with John Allan of AAA Monuments.

Breitenstein later spearheaded the design and proposal to fund the new monument. As part of the project — funded by almost \$25,000 in donations — the post's bell tower was also renovated.

"A special thank-you goes out to the SAL leadership team and Legion leadership team for funding and approving the project, including our late commander Joe Mailchle and current commander Jeff Durden, who both championed the project," Breitenstein said.
